FAST FACTS

At 28.5%, the Art Gallery received the largest percentage increase in operating funds for all public galleries in the country from the Canada Council for the Arts.

James Coutts' generous donation of 194 works from his personal collection, and 28 works from the Nanton Series by renowned photographer Geoffrey James, added a strong local focus to the excellent holding of landscape works in the U of L Art Collection.

The Art Gallery completed a multi-year survey of all the drawings, prints, photographs and other works on paper in the U of L Collection. The project was supported with a grant for \$40,027 from the highly competitive Museum Assistance Program of the Department of Canadian Heritage.

The Art Gallery launched the latest version of our innovative online database for the entire U of L Art Collection. We continue to lead the nation in providing in-depth access to images and information about the 14,000 art works in our care.

Building on the success of our recent expansion of public programs, the Art Gallery launched a new online education program that supports teaching about the issues connected to art as well as developing creative skills.

Following an assessment of the Art Gallery's governance and role within the university, a new Art Gallery Advisory Committee was formed. The committee's first task was to assist with examining the perception of the Art Gallery on campus.

With its embossed, hot pink cover, the Snap, Crackle, Pop publication was much coveted and continued the Art Gallery's strong publication program and support of research by artists.

EXHIBITIONS

In 2010/11, the Art Gallery presented a range of exhibitions that included a survey of Jamelie Hassan's powerful exploration of the exchange between cultures, a set of interactive instruments by emerging Vancouver sculptor Alison MacTaggart, an experimental project from local artist Emily Luce, and the public debut of paintings and other works from the Coutts gift. Assistant Curator Jane Edmundson produced a thought-provoking dialogue between work in the Collection that plays with the nature of language related to stereotypes of Aboriginal people and work produced by First Nations artists. Undergraduate art students got an exceptional boost to their professional development when guest curator Emily Falvey selected works for the Annual Curated Student Exhibition and Museum Studies students had the opportunity to work with the Collection for projects around campus, including an exhibition on the 1950s.



PUBLIC PROGRAMS

A total of 372 people participated in the nine Culture Vulture Saturdays In projects that ranged from creating a Lethbridge Mandala to making ink from natural materials and producing prints.

In its fourth year, Culture Vulture Saturday (CVS) is designed to offer public programming experiences to the university community and the public at large. All activities carry a theme based on the Art Gallery's exhibitions or events happening on campus. While the majority of our participants are children, the activities are for all ages and designed to be multi-levelled, as they can be made as simple or as challenging as needed. CVS also allows the general public the opportunity to come to the gallery on a Saturday, which is beneficial for those who do not work on campus and those who are not able to go to the gallery during regular weekday hours.

The Art Gallery launched a new Online Education Program in February 2011 with a presentation to the South Western Alberta Teachers' Convention. Having tested several pilot options for education programs, the Art Gallery determined that an online program would be the most valuable for teachers and primary or secondary students, as well as a feasible option to add to the Art Gallery's programming. The new section of our website started with two programs: the art making project "Prairie Ink" for all ages and a Grade 7 Social Studies unit on the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway and the developments of tourism after confederation. The first program includes a how-to video based on one of the Culture Vulture Saturday activities, and the second is an online gallery of 19th century artworks from the U of L Art Collection with informative text panels and a lecture-style video about the publication Picturesque Canada.

ACQUISITIONS

With the assistance of a grant from the Canada Council for the Arts, the Art Gallery bought five works by Calgary artist Lisa Brawn from her delightfully clever "Quien es mas macho? Canadiana" series. Bubbles, David Suzuki, Stompin' Tom, Johnny LaRue and Peter Mansbridge were favourites amongst visitors to last year's Snap, Crackle, Pop exhibition. Brawn also donated a further three works from the series and Christopher Moore donated Passive Passive Pink (Formation), which was also prominently featured in the exhibition. Moore's campy flocked toy fighter jets and Brawn's playful approach to icons of Canadian culture build on our excellent holding of Pop art by Canadian and International artists. All acquisition and loan numbers are for the calendar year 2010.

In 2010, acquired 225 works in total (180 contemporary works).

CONSERVATION

The works-on-paper project undertaken over the past year involved unframing, moving, upgrading overall storage, condition reporting, photographing and inventory of 4400 works on paper stored in the Art Vault. Related to this activity, we were able to maximize the space of our vault and improve the use of data generated from detailed condition reports. As well, the larger goal of completing a detailed assessment of the 9000+ works on paper in the U of L Art Collection was met – with this recent project building on previous attention to other sections of the Collection. The Art Gallery held a successful public frame sale of hundreds of frames removed from artworks during the project, with the proceeds going to student scholarships.

Beyond the major conservation project, gallery staff also conducted conservation treatment work on 56 works on paper in the Collection.

GRANTS & FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Canada Council for the Arts, Assistance to Art Museums and Public Galleries \$45,000/ year for April 1, 2010 – March 31, 2013

The U of L Art Gallery did exceptionally well with this peer-reviewed grant. We had the highest percentage increase to our grant of all the applicants in Canada (28.5%) and we tied for second for the largest increase (\$10,000). There were 79 grants awarded: 3 were new additions, 17 had increases, 53 remained constant, and 6 had decreases.

Alberta Foundation for the Arts, Post Secondary Program \$25,000 for June 1, 2010 – March 31, 2011

The Art Gallery received the same amount as our grant for the prior year. Given that the AFA had significant budget cuts, remaining constant was a good result.

Museums Assistance Program, Department of Canadian Heritage \$40,027 for the "Improve Preservation and Increase Access" project April 1, 2010 – March 31, 2011

This grant is peer-reviewed. The program is open to all types of museums in Canada and thus there is a large pool of applicants. For this project, the Art Gallery conducted a punctual intervention to improve the preservation of and access to framed works on paper in the Art Collection. Related to this activity, we maximized the use of our Art Vault and improved the use of data generated from detailed conservation assessments.



PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES & OUTREACH

While on contract for the conservation project, Juliet Graham was called in as an emergency consultant for the Lethbridge Time capsule in spring 2010 when its contents were discovered to be wet and gave a workshop on how to care for these contents for the owners of the documents. Graham also presented a museum cataloguing workshop to the Prairie Tractor and Engine Society Museum to assist them in gaining Museums Alberta accreditation. Based on her conservation work for the Art Gallery, Graham presented a paper at the Canadian Association for Conservation of Cultural Property 2010 annual conference and is currently the regional rep for CAC.

Josephine Mills gave a public lecture at the Southern Alberta Art Gallery, "Deaccessioning: The Root of All Scandal," and a public lecture at the Sir Alexander Galt Museum & Archives, "The looming crisis for public collections."

In 2011, the Art Gallery provided photographs of over 50 artworks from the U of L Art Collection for reproduction in numerous Canadian and international publications, including 'Haute Culture: General Idea' (Le Musée d'Art moderne de la Ville de Paris), 'Painters Eleven: The Wild Ones of Canadian Art' (D&M Publishers, Vancouver), and 'Billy J. McCarroll: How to Play a Winning Game Your Natural Way' (Southern Alberta Art Gallery, Lethbridge). Jane Edmundson served as the primary photographer for the SAAG's McCarroll retrospective publication, which included work from the U of L Art Collection, the Glenbow Museum and numerous private collections.
