ARTISTIC STATEMENT



HIGHLIGHTS

Total Attendance Overall: 27,456

The University of Lethbridge Art Gallery created our first stand alone strategic plan. Led by Don McIntyre, an Ojibwa artist and faculty member in the Dhillon School of Business, the inclusive process set the Gallery up to build on our recent successes, negotiate forthcoming challenges around budgets, and implement decolonization.

The Art Gallery partnered with Blackfoot Elders, artists and academics in Alberta and in England, and Principal Investigator Christine Clark, an Assistant Professor in the Department of New Media, on a successful Exploration Grant for \$250,000 from the Government of Canada's New Frontiers in Research program. The grant funds the launch of the Blackfoot Digital project which involves creating high resolution digital imagery of historic Blackfoot objects in museums in England and connecting the knowledge from these objects with people on Blackfoot territory here in Southern Alberta.



marched from the Art Gallery to the new building carrying colourful banners with scientific and mathematical equations for this performance that addressed relationships between people and ideas.

Under the banner of Pop-Up Studio, the Art Gallery experimented with turning the Hess gallery into a space for creation and interaction in September and October, 2019. The visiting artists from England involved with the Blackfoot Digital project ran workshops on 3D photography and presented work in progress. With Art Collection Show 'n' Tell, the Art Gallery collections staff demonstrated techniques involved with caring for the University's art collection. The event proved so successful that we ran it a second time in the new year.

In October, we explored what happens when an artist and a curator work with a team of monkey scientists. In Borderline Human, Icelandic artist Gunnhildur Hauksdóttir turned the Hess Gallery into a set for play and research. There were opportunities to talk to the artist and PhD student Miranda Lucas about their research as well as time for visitors to come and play. For a final performance in the installation, the artist worked with Edmonton dancer Gianna Varcirca and students from Drama, Art, and Psychology to explore movement and non-verbal social interaction. The project was the culmination of 3 years of a research partnership with Hauksdóttir and Level 2: Lichen Lab (an art and science collaboration at uLethbridge) that included the artist traveling to the Barrett Henzi field site in South Africa to work with the Lichen Lab scientists as they study vervet monkeys in the wild.

The Covid-19 pandemic hit in March 2020 at the end of this reporting period. The Art Gallery was not able to install Stories for the British Museum, an exhibition by students in Jackson 2bears' Indigenous Studio Course. The students had made art work in response to the Blackfoot Digital project. We hope to install the work in Fall 2020 in order to document the project and present the art works online.



PUBLIC PROGRAMS

Gallery public programmer Kirsten Meiszinger and student assistants Summer Jennings and Thea Sleight raised the Art Gallery's social media activity to a whole new level. They engaged with works in the collection, ran exhibition-related programming, and responded to a range of timely events as well as running contests with excellent art making prizes. Our in-person art events built from the Pop-up Studio in the gallery and added opportunities for people to make their own art works. A welcome-back event in the first week of classes invited people to try a variety of art making approaches at their own pace: the Art Making & Chill Studio, was a resounding success and we will add the event to our regular schedule of programs. Local artist Eric Dyck returned by popular demand as a cartoonist-in-residence as he prepared for an exhibition later in 2020.

THE ART COLLECTION

The gallery produced 10 exhibitions that included works from the permanent collection. 194 collection artworks by 92 different artists were shown in our two gallery spaces. Of those 194 artworks, 132 of them were from the Hess bequest. 57 FNMI artists produced 69 of the works that were displayed in these exhibitions, and 47 female artists created 76 of the artworks included in these exhibitions. 80 of the 92 artists were Canadian, and 10 of those were from Alberta.

The recent Hess bequest was featured this year in a number of exhibitions, including 1 made up of 40 Inuit prints, as well as exhibitions presenting the work of Alberta artists John Snow, and Alfred and Barbara Leighton. This year as well included 3 exhibitions curated by student interns.

Highlights from the Hess bequest made up a large part of an exhibition featuring Roloff Beny alongside masters including Joan Miró, Pablo Picasso, Georges Rouault, Rufino Tamayo, Salvador Dali, Alberto Giacometti, and others.

The gallery hosted 4 Museum Studies interns over the course of this past year: Summer Jennings, Jaylyn Potts, Thea Sleight and Emily Drummond who all did wonderful work with public programming, research and collections projects, as well as curating and installing exhibitions.



GRANTS

The Art Gallery received multiple grants in 2019-2020. An internal uLethbridge SSHRC Exchange Grant for \$7,000 supported the installation costs for Borderline Human. A \$15,000 Exhibition Circulation grant from **Museums Assistance Program, Department** of Canadian Heritage, covered the shipping costs and artists' fees to bring in the exhibition #nofilterneeded from the McMaster Museum of Art. The Art Gallery received a \$42,000 Arts **Across Canada grant from the Canada Council** for the Arts for a tour of José Luis Torres' exhibition The Everyday Future to 4 art galleries across Canada. We received a Young Canada Works grant and a STEP grant to hire students Summer Jennings and Jaylyn Potts for the summer to work on collections projects and public programs.
